From the desk of Mayor Niwinski

Since our fall issue of the Connection, we have seen the arrival of the much anticipated tote program in our Village. Many residents are still adjusting to the every other week recycling. If you have any questions as to when you are scheduled for recycling collection, please review the street list located on page four. Our Highway Department has undertaken the garbage tote exchanges for those residents who feel the 95 gallon tote is too large for their needs. If you want to exercise this option, please contact the Village Hall office staff at 897-1560 for arrangements. If you find that the totes delivered to you are not adequate for your trash/ recycling needs, you can purchase additional totes at cost. The goals of this program are many: increased recycling by providing larger bins; less trash disposal into landfills; cost savings by recycling bi-weekly; and controlling the rodent problem.

As reported in earlier issues, we applied for an EPA Brownfield's grant for the 14 acres owned by the Village along Lovejoy Street. The process has progressed to Phase II, where soil samples were collected by an independent agency and we

are awaiting results. Watch for future updates on this project, as we discuss remediation and development of this property to its fullest potential.

In a continued effort undertaken over the last several years, we are making necessary improvements to our Fire Hall on Gates Street. We are currently requesting bids for a new heating and air conditioning system for the building. The existing system is the original, and almost fifty years old. A new system will greatly increase efficiency and reduce utility costs. This project will be partially funded through our Community Development Block Grant Program, using federal HUD monies. There are other grants available through NYSERDA for lighting fixtures and updates that will further reduce our long-term electrical costs. Throughout the next year, we will be doing a complete facilities review, determining where we can reduce costs.

I am pleased to announce that the sanitary sewer projects on Wagner, Atlantic, Village Lane, Halstead, Griffith, Gates, Blick, Roland and Rutland are complete. Utilizing Village funds, EPA and DEC grants, over \$1,000,000 in work was done. I worked closely with Keith Marquis,

Village engineer, over the last three years to develop these projects with the goals of eliminating overflow from storm into the sanitary system, which we have to pay for treatment. It also eliminates sanitary from flowing into our storm system and directly into Lake Erie. Projects included pipe "sliplining", pipe replacement, manhole repairs and drain inlet replacements.

To remain a viable Village, we must continue moving Sloan forward by increasing efficiencies, superior services and supporting programs that enhance the quality of our community. Please consider participating in some of our many activities: Seniors can join the Center on Halstead and participate in the Nutrition Program, exercise, Pokeno, cards and trips; children can visit the vised Recreation Center daily, our pool and two parks in the summer, Easter, loween and Christmas Parties; and let's not forget the Arts Council Summer Concerts; and the Annual Family Picnic. If anyone has suggestions for additional events, I ask them to please share their ideas with me.
